The 2023/2024 Academic Year saw Cowley College shine, academically and athletically.

One of the highlights of the year was the fall theatre production of Young Frankenstein. The production was outstanding in acting, costumes and set design performing in front of a large audience in the Brown Center Theater. The Visual and Performing Arts department continues to provide quality education to students and excellent performances in music, theatre and arts.

Cowley athletic teams had an excellent year, highlighted by three National Championships. Women's Volleyball won the big tournament in Cedar Rapids, IA, with an undefeated season. Women's Cross Country took home the National Championship trophy by winning the meet at Huntsville, AL. Women's tennis team took home the title at the NJCAA DI national championship in Texas. In addition, the College Quiz Bowl team placed 10th at Nationals and 2nd at state, while Phi Theta Kappa was again honored as a five-star chapter.

Numerous events were hosted by the College, both educational and inspirational. The annual youth Robotics Challenge was held at the Sumner campus, providing a day of fun and learning to local middle school students. Cowley Mulvane hosted a fall and a spring event for students and the community. The College hosted the Cowley C.A.R.E.S for Teaching Professionals, with 52 early childhood educators in attendance. These are just a few examples of the community outreach of Cowley College.

This year, we will celebrate the grand opening of the new Tyler Technical Education Center. With the completion of the new career and technical education building, two



programs that have called Ireland Hall home, will be moving to the new facility. Criminal Justice and Cosmetology programs will experience a new custom design to better serve students in the programs. The College continues to make facility improvements to enhance the learning experience for our students.

Notable guests on campus this year have included senator Roger Marshall, making a visit in September, and representative Bill Rhiley, taking in the sites of the new technical education center.

The 101st Commencement ceremony featuring Outstanding Alumni Dr. Kermit McMurry ('65), and former student Hannah Nicolaisen ('22) as the speaker was held in May. In addition to the campus ceremony, two graduation events were held at the


Winfield Correctional Facility where 47 degrees were awarded. A total of 672 students earned 867 awards (degrees and certificates) during the year.

Educate the State:A Partnership To Address the State Teacher Shortage

Public-private educational partnership makes teaching degrees more affordable for future Kansas teachers.

A group of five area colleges have announced a new partnership called Educate the State aimed at positively impacting the current teacher shortage in Kansas.

The new public-private agreement brings together Cowley College, Butler Community College, Friends University, Newman University, and Southwestern College. By working together, the institutions have created a seamless and more affordable transfer option for Secondary Education majors.

In 2022, the Kansas Independent Colleges Association (KICA) announced a global transfer for any Kansas community college graduate earning an Associate of Arts (A.A.) or Associate of Science (A.S.) degree to transfer as a junior status directly to any Kansas private university.

Educate the State takes it a step further as these institutions also guarantee a lower tuition rate at the private university level for those wanting to become K-12 teachers.

Tuition per credit hour is discounted to \$300 per credit hour at the university

level for Educate the State students. That equates to a \$22,000 scholarship at Friends University.

How to Access Educate the State:

- 1. Earn a Secondary Education associate degree from Butler or Cowley with a 2.75 minimum GPA.
- 2. Transfer to Friends, Newman or Southwestern based on subject matter emphasis as a full-time Secondary Education major.
- 3. Receive the discounted \$300 tuition rate for final two years regardless of the four-year institution selected.










Cowley Theatre Puts on an Electrifying Performance of Young Frankenstein

Cowley College recently held its annual Robotics Challenge at the Sumner Campus. The 2024 Robotics Challenge featured 15 schools and 30 teams in an assembly code race and was sponsored by Cowley College, Sumner-Cowley Electric, KanOkla, and Sumner County Economic Development. Students worked hard between assembly day and the event to program and code their machines. They came to the event ready to show their skills and put their knowledge on the line.

By providing opportunities like this challenge, students get hands-on experience with technology and develop problem-solving skills, creativity, and teamwork—all of which are essential in STEM fields and beyond. It is encouraging to see educational institutions emphasizing the importance of STEM education and providing platforms for students to showcase their talents. Events like these can inspire the next generation

of innovators and problem solvers, and Cowley College is proud to host them.

According to their website, "The purpose behind this Robotics Challenge is to engage our younger generation in the STEM side of education. STEM, standing for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math, is an ever-changing, increasingly complex world. In today's day and age, you will see the influence of STEM almost everywhere you go. From the tractors in the field to the weather forecast on the news, STEM research and education is a vital part of everyday life" (Sumner County Robotics).

The panel of judges consisted of Cowley College, KanOkla, Harper Industries, Wellington, and Sumner County representatives. Winners in the Basic Competition included Arkansas City Team Thing 1 in First Place, Arkansas City Team Thing 2 in Second Place,

and Caldwell Team Jaybot 7 in Third Place. For the Advanced Competition, the Winners were Anthony in First, Arkansas City in Second, and Wellington Elementary in Third.

Cowley Vice President of Finance and Administration Holly Harper, who assisted with the event, said, "What an extraordinary event! It's fascinating to witness the dedication and enthusiasm of these young people towards STEM education. With 178 students competing over the two-day event from surrounding middle schools and even a 5th-grade team. These students are so talented and have a passion for their craft. I truly enjoy watching these students figure out the challenges and enjoy the process. Congratulations to all the participants, as well as their coaches and instructors, for their hard work and commitment."



Cowley Volleyball Team Presented National Championship Rings During Ceremony

The Lady Tigers defeated the Scottsdale Fighting Artichokes in five sets to claim the 2023 National Championship. It had been 140 days between the championship match and the ring ceremony, and the program was excited that the day had finally arrived.

"This day is the day that our players have been anxiously waiting for since we won the national championship," said head coach Steven Gream.

The team accomplished numerous feats throughout the 2023 season, including the first undefeated championship season in Cowley history and the second in NJCAA history. The team posted the best winning percentage (1.000) in school history, posted the second most wins by a Cowley Volleyball team, won the conference championship by being unbeaten in the Jayhawk Conference Eastern Division (10-0), and won the

Plains A District championship. The Lady Tigers finished the season with a record of 41-0 and lost only five sets during the season. These honors and more made the 2023 season one of the most dominant seasons in NJCAA history.

The voice of the Tigers, Scott Gurnee, was the MC of the event and was joined by Cowley President Dr. Michelle Schoon, Cowley Athletic Director Jeff Fluty, and head coach Steven Gream, the NJCAA Division II National Coach of the Year, to speak. The crowd also had an opportunity to relive Cowley winning the national championship as they watched the fifth and final set of the win over Scottsdale (AZ). Then, the rings were presented to Cowley administrators, staff, and volunteers, followed by the players and coaches of the 2023 volleyball program.



They did it! Lady Tiger Tennis Captures First National Championship



With four singles national champions and two doubles champs, the Cowley College women's tennis team placed first at the NJCAA Division I National Championships held May 4-8 at the JoAnn Medlock Murphy Tennis Center in Tyler, TX. The title was the first in the history of the program.

Entering the final day of the tournament with a two-point advantage over the defending national champion Hillsborough Community College, the Lady Tigers won five of six final matches against the Hawks to claim the national championship. Hillsborough would finish second and Tyler Junior College placed third.

Arianna Raga, who was a former player at Cowley and an assistant coach to her brother Manuel Raga when Cowley finished as the national runner-up a season ago, was grateful for the opportunity to lead this amazing group of young ladies.

"We have been so close the last couple of years, and it was always my goal to win nationals as a player and to come back one day and help the team win it all," Raga said. "The girls gave everything they had today and are always willing to do whatever it takes."

After finishing as the national runner-up as a team a season ago, returning sophomores Arina Babenko and Mariana Jimenez were crucial to the Lady Tigers getting the job done in 2024.

"Those two provided guidance to the younger players and were a huge help to the team," Raga said.

Babenko repeated as the national champion at No. 2 singles and teamed with Yerkezhan Arystanbekova to finish as the national runner-up at No. 1 doubles, while Jimenez lost a hard-fought match in the finals of No. 6 singles before bouncing back to team with Serena Pereyra to win the finals of No. 3 doubles.

"Arina always performs well in the clutch," Raga said. "I am so happy for Arina to win back-to-back singles titles and for Marianna to win the doubles title with Serena."

Lady Tiger freshmen Yerkezhan

Arystanbekova, Serena Pereyra and Akari Tomoyose captured titles at No. 1, 3, and 4 singles and did not drop a set en route to their singles titles.

"They are all so talented, and we are fortunate to have them at Cowley," Raga said.

Also new to Cowley this season was Lady Tiger assistant coach Brady Matthews, who, along with Raga, was integral in leading the team throughout the season.

Cowley had already captured the team title before doubles play even started. However, the Lady Tigers captured doubles titles from all three doubles teams.

Cowley captured doubles titles from its No. 2 doubles tandem of Roselida Asumwa and Akari Tomoyose, as well as its No. 3 doubles team of Mariana Jimenez and Serena Pereyra.

With six of Cowley's eight players being freshmen, the Lady Tigers should enter next season ranked No. 1 with a chance to repeat as national champs.

Women's Cross Country Team Nabs Second National Title in Past Four Years



Nothing was going to stop the Cowley College women's cross country team from accomplishing their goal of being national champions, not even a flu bug that ran through the team leading up to the race. The Lady Tigers placed five runners in the top-25 and claimed its second national championship in the past four years by winning the 2023 NJCAA Division II women's cross-country national championship held Saturday in Huntsville, AL.

This was the second DII National Title in school history and the third overall with the team capturing the 2010 NJCAA Division I national championship. The Lady Tigers completed a historic performance, finishing the day with 66 team points. Heartland (IL) came in a close second with 71 points. Paradise Valley (AZ), Mesa (AZ), and Des Moines Area (IL) rounded out the top 5 finishers.

"Our girls had themselves a day, they were every bit of incredible," Cowley head coach Cameron Rieth said. "If people knew of the backstory leading into this race, how six of the seven girls were battling the flu the last 10 days of the season and some barely were able to practice going into nationals. They were still not 100 percent on race day. Talking with our trainer Blake Smith the morning of the race, I told him, our girls' team is feisty, if they are going to go down, they are going to go down swinging. As soon as that gun went off a pack of orange shot straight to front of the pack."

Dheniffer Vaz, the lone sophomore on the team, finished eighth with a time of 18:46.50 in the 5,000-meter race and earned Second-Team All-American honors for her efforts. Kayli Myers, Leticia Belo, Brittannia Willis, and Lakota Schultz also ran amazing races and earned Coaches Association All-American honors.


"With how sick they were coming in, I honestly did not know what to expect and do not know how they pulled it off, other than just willing themselves to it. I am at a loss for words," Rieth said. "Heartland almost reeled us


in at the end, and I don't think I would have been too upset if they did, because we really ran all out from the start. That type of effort is all you can ask for as a coach and it was amazing to see and be a part of."

Robert & Gwen Tyler Honored by Cowley College



Robert and Gwen Tyler will be honored this August when the newly constructed Cowley College Career and Technical Education building becomes the "Tyler Technical Education Center." The Tyler's leadership gift of \$2,000,000 to Cowley College has made the project possible. The Cowley College Board of Trustees approved this new name at its May board meeting.

"Words can not adequately express our thanks and gratitude to the Tylers," said Dr. Michelle Schoon, College President. "Their leadership gift helped leverage a \$4 million ARPA grant from the State of Kansas and created the energy needed to push towards \$8 million for the project.

As the Founder of Husky Liners, based in Winfield, Kansas, Robert Tyler became an industry leader in manufacturing automotive aftermarket products designed to protect cars and trucks inside and out. Tyler believes the new technical center will provide opportunities to build a skilled local and regional workforce. "We need more students who want to enter the skilled workforce," Tyler said. "We hope this gift will help the college

leverage opportunities to provide much-needed training for our region."

The new Tyler Technical Education Center will produce a more skilled workforce for the region and create meaningful employment. "Those graduating and being certified from the new center will be qualified for some of the best-paying jobs in the region," said Cowley College Foundation Board Chair Mike Munson.

According to Cowley College Foundation President and CEO Dr. Kori Gregg, the Tyler's leadership gift gave legitimacy and energy to the campaign. "Foundations, individuals, and businesses have been encouraged and inspired by the fundraising campaign. Now they know who lit the fuse," said Gregg about the Tyler's gift. "To date, we have raised \$7.8 million."


The facility is a significant investment in the future of Cowley College students and the community at large. By providing access to high-quality career and technical education, the center will create a pipeline of skilled professionals who will drive economic growth, innovation, and success in the region.

"There is a ripple effect when diverse trade skills go unfilled," Dr. Michelle Schoon said. "From home and commercial construction to the oil fields, and from manufacturing to electric companies, the economy is slowed when businesses can not find qualified employees. This project creates employment – a profession – for hundreds, builds businesses, and grows the economy."

"We are still engaging alumni, friends, businesses, and foundations to help complete the Tyler Technical Education Center campaign," said Dr. Kori Gregg. "Seldom does the college have a capital project of this importance. For decades to come, students and the regional economy will benefit. We are thankful for all the donors who have chosen to invest in this important endeavor.".

A grand opening celebration has been scheduled for August 16th, 2024, at 3:00 p.m. at the Tyler Technical Education Center on the main campus of Cowley College.

Community Colleges Celebrate Impactful Contribution to the Kansas Economy



Elevating affordable transfer programs and career and technical education, Kansas community colleges invited citizens to join them in celebrating National Community College Month this April. With community colleges spread across the state, these institutions drive economic growth, provide the workforce critical to the state's economy, and foster educational opportunities that make possible prosperous economic futures for students.

An economic study released in November 2023 by Lightcast, a labor market analytics firm, found that between 2021 – 2022 Kansas' community colleges added \$6.7 billion in income to the state economy, or approximately 3.3% of Kansas' gross state product (GSP).

The affordability of community colleges is a major financial advantage to students. Kansas' robust network of community colleges served more than 90,000 students in 2023.

"Kansas community colleges are undoubtedly the best value in higher education—whether a student is seeking a pathway to a four-year degree or wants to receive the education needed to go directly into a skilled trade, Kansas community colleges are ready to serve students of all ages at an affordable price," said Heather Morgan, executive director of the Kansas Association of Community Colleges.

National Community College Month serves as an opportunity to reflect on and celebrate the transformative power of community colleges, which continue to bridge the gap between the unskilled and a trained workforce. Career-focused programs, flexible schedules, and lower tuition have afforded thousands of Kansans the opportunity to achieve their educational and professional aspirations.

One of the many ways that Cowley College continues to promote

education is through our career and technical education program. In a continued effort to bolster programs like Criminal Justice, Cosmetology, and HVAC Cowley has undertaken construction of a Technical Education Center to be completed by July of 2024.

clinic, and athletic competitions. Through this educational experience, students will begin to build a solid foundation for their academic and professional future in athletic training or other allied healthcare specializations associated with the physically active.
